




Vocational pathways

Vocational Pathways provide tools so you can develop a career map and plan what you may need to study to meet your goals and move into further study and the workforce.

STAR courses are short taster style classes that help you to explore career options and make informed decisions about your future schooling, work or study. Courses take place over one to nine weeks and are only a few days in total.

Creative Industries

Drawing



Term 3 6 weeks Use drawing methods and skills for recording information using wet and dry media.



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Construction & Infrastructure

Students must wear safety boots in all workshop classes

Carpentry



Term 2 & 3





1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Gain an introduction into the carpentry and construction industry. The course allows you to undertake a small building, construction, and allied trades (BCAT) project to become familiar with hardware and fastenings.

Painting and Decorating



Term 3





1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

This course has been designed to give you an introduction to the painting and decorating industry. It will allow you to undertake a painting and decorating project to familiarise you with basic tools and equipment used within the industry.

Plumbing



Term 3

3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Get an introduction to plumbing, gasfitting and drainlaying. There will be a number of practical activities to demonstrate the nature of the work and act as a taster for the Trades Academy and full-time courses.

Manufacturing & Technology

Students must wear safety boots in all workshop classes

Automotive



Term 2 & 3 3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Work on real engines and cars and gain insight into a career as an automotive professional. Over the weeks, you'll dismantle, inspect and reassemble an engine in our fully-equipped workshop.

Electrical



Term 2 & 3 3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

The skills demonstrated in this course apply to most electrical and electronic trades. You will perform soldering procedures and will gain knowledge of electrical safety and safe working practices in an electrical workplace.







Mechanical Engineering



Term 2 & 3 3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Work in our fully equipped mechanical engineering workshop. Develop core fabrication and mechanical skills in a practical environment. You will undertake a fabrication project and get an insight to the pre-trade programmes.

Welding & Fabrication



Term 2 & 3 3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Learn the skills required to use the gas metal arc welding or MIG process safely. The course is suitable for those who wish to enter the welding or engineering industry.

Service Industries

Bakery



Term 2 and 4 6 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

The STAR Bakery course will give you an overview and introduction to baking goods in a commercial environment. You will be equipped with health and safety skills and will learn what you need to do to pursue a career in chef training/baking.

Beauty Therapy¹



Term 2 6 weeks



1 day per week - 9am-2.30pm

The course is designed to give you an introduction to beauty treatments such as mini facials, nail file and paint, hand massage and eyebrow grooming. You will also learn personal presentation while gaining elementary skills.

Cookery



Term 4 6 weeks



1 day per week – 9am - 2:30pm

Our STAR Introduction to Cookery Programme is designed for students who are interested in hospitality and cookery as a career path. This programme gives an insight into what is needed to become a chef, and will give you a feel for working in a commercial kitchen.

Hair, Beauty and Makeup¹



Term 2 & 3 6 weeks



1 day per week – 9am-2.30pm

The course is designed to give students an introduction into how to perform a manicure, learn basic make-up application techniques and style long hair using heated tools. You will also learn personal presentation while gaining elementary skills.

Hairdressing (New Plymouth)¹



Term 2 6 weeks This course is designed to give you an introduction to the hairdressing industry. You will learn personal presentation and gain elementary skills.



1 day per week – 9am - 2:30pm

Hospitality - Barista*



Term 3 9 weeks Term 4 3 weeks*



1 day per week – 9am - 2:30pm

*3 days per week – 9am - 2:30pm

This course is designed to give you an introduction to the hospitality industry by providing the opportunity to learn how to use commercial espresso coffee equipment and prepare espresso beverages. You will also learn how to prepare and present espresso beverages for service.

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Hospitality - Front of House*



Term 3 6 weeks



1 day per week – 9am - 2:30pm

This course covers a basic understanding of hospitality terminology, equipment, personal presentation, preparation and clearing of areas for table service in a commercial establishment.

Make-Up1



Term 2 6 weeks



1 day per week - 9am-2.30pm

This course is designed to give you an introduction to the make-up industry, learning basic make-up application as well as exploring your creative side; applying bold on-trend techniques.

Sport & Fitness



Term 3 4 weeks Start learning skills for a career in sport and fitness. Gain knowledge about exercise equipment and the professional gym environment.



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Primary Industries

Agriculture



Term 3 3 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

This course will introduce you to a commercial farming environment. You will learn about animal behaviour, control and feed management.

Forestry



Term 3





1 day per week – 9am - 2:30pm

This course will introduce you to the forestry industry. You will learn about forest harvesting operations and quality and value factors in logs.

Rural Driving



Term 3 10 weeks



1 day per week - 9am - 2:30pm

Get ready to take the learner driving test. You will gain practical skills that you can apply in a rural driving situation. This course will build your confidence to sit the driving test.

Skills for Living

Skills for Living



Term 2 & 3 7 weeks



1 day per week - 10am - 2pm

This course is designed to assist students with special learning disabilities to develop personal skills that will assist them to function productively within a tertiary environment in the future and to transition smoothly from secondary school.

For secondary school students studying towards NCEA Level 1 or 2. You should have a genuine interest in a particular vocational pathway.

In the Taranaki Trades Academy you come to WITT Te Pūkenga at least one day a week over several terms and gain NCEA credits. The learning takes place in a practical and hands-on environment using industry standard equipment and technology relevant to your chosen career path. Develop the foundation skills needed to progress to further study opportunities or move directly into employment.

You will learn skills including; graphics, design, media and portfolio generation. Further study available in creative technology or digital technology at WITT.

Radio Broadcasting (Level 3)



Term 1 – 3



25 credits (Level 3) 5 credits (Level 2) This course partners with local radio stations to provide an authentic experience and enabling you to get involved in a broadcasting environment.

Leads to Ara - Bachelor of Broadcasting Communications (Journalism)



Choose this pathway if you enjoy:

- using communication skills, such as writing or presenting

Construction & Infrastructure

If you enjoy teamwork, a varied workday and learning by doing then this could be the pathway for you. Work in this incredibly important industry is varied, rewarding and often physically active. You can take pride in playing your part to build, repair and maintain New Zealand from below the ground up.

Build a Bach (Level 2) (New Plymouth and Hāwera)

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Term 1 - 4



56 credits (mainly Level 2)



3 days per week

Gain experience in building, construction, carpentry, roofing, how to read and interpret plans, health and safety, plus hand and power tool use and maintenance. You will spend three days at WITT and work on building projects and a small dwelling. There is also an opportunity to participate in work experience.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Construction Trade Skills (Carpentry) (Level 3)

Build a Bridge (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



21 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

You will work with the Talent Pipeline companies and NPDC to create a foot bridge for the community.

Leads to NZ Certificate in Infrastructure Works (Level 2)

Electrical (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



23 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn to use electrical test instruments and the elements and processes of electrical circuits. You will perform manual soldering and de-soldering and gain knowledge of electrical diagrams.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Electrical Pre-Trade (Level 3)

Joinery (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



22 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Gain knowledge of portable power tools, carpentry hand tools, timber machining equipment, timber, mechanical and non-mechanical construction equipment.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Construction Trade Skills (Carpentry) (Level 3)

Painting and Decorating (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



18 credits (Level 2)



Thursday

Are you inspired by colour and want to start a voyage into a painting and decorating career? Jumpstart your journey and gain the basic skills to become a professional tradesperson. You will learn how to handle painting and decorating equipment and materials. You will also complete practical painting projects.

Leads to a Level 3 construction skills qualification in painting and plastering which is a pathway into an apprenticeship.

Plumbing (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



Tuesdays

Learn introductory skills in residential plumbing and trades services. This course leads to the New Zealand Certificate in Plumbing, Gasfitting and Drainlaying (Level 3) or onto work places and a Level 4 apprenticeship. Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Plumbing, Gas fitting and Drainlaying (Level 3)





Choose this pathway if you enjoy:

- physical work and working with your hands
- working with tools, machinery and equipment to do building, repair or maintenance work
- following and developing plans and specifications
- problem solving
- making calculations, and preparing estimates and quotes for costs and materials.

Manufacturing & Technology

If you have an interest in making things work, are inquisitive and able to think outside the box then this may be the pathway for you. Covering a whole range of working styles from hands-on assembly to cutting-edge research, busy production lines to crafts and computer design, this pathway offers opportunities to make new discoveries and a practical difference to the world.

Automotive (Level 2)

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Term 1 - 3



20 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn about workshop practices, hazardous materials and knowledge of tools and equipment, lamps, wheel balancing, general engineering, automotive components and petrol fuel systems. You will also disassemble and reassemble an engine under supervision.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Automotive Engineering (Level 3)

Engineering Trades (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



18 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn about engineering equipment, components and how to perform basic machining, fabrication and welding techniques in our fully equipped workshops.

Leads to Engineering (Level 3) - Build a Trailer

Engineering Trades (Level 3) – Build a Trailer (New Plymouth and Hāwera)



Term 1 - 3



12 credits (Level 3) 18 credits (Level 2)



Mondays and Tuesdays

Aimed at students following on from Engineering Level 2. You will build on your capabilities in mechanical engineering to earn Level 2 and 3 credits while building a trailer. The programme includes low carbon steel welding, thermal cutting and automotive wiring.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Automotive Engineering (Level 3); New Zealand Diploma in Engineering (Civil or Mechanical) (Level 6)

Engineering E2E (Level 3)



Term 1 - 4



Approx. 8 credits (mainly Level 3)



Thursdays

If you are considering a future in Engineering and are strong in Maths, Physics and Technology, complete the Engineering Fundamentals course. This course explores the range of engineering disciplines including the fundamentals of statics, dynamics and mechanical engineering concepts, stress and strain, deriving elastic properties from tensile test results and the properties of fluids, electrical voltage, current and resistance, and heat and energy transfer.

Leads to New Zealand Diploma in Engineering (Civil or Mechanical) (Level 6)

- food processing or production
- using technology to develop and monitor production
- working with your hands
- managing and planning production.

20 credits (Level 2)



Fridays

Learn about budgets, the client journey, safety and hygiene and practical barbering applications at the basin and in the chair. Aimed at students Years 11, 12 and 13.

Beauty & Make Up (Level 2) (2 classes)1



Term 1 - 3



14 credits (Level 2) 4 credits (Level 3)



Thursdays or Fridays

Learn to perform cosmetic services and facial treatments while recognising different facial skin types. Unpack current fashion trends related to beauty therapy and apply make-up techniques suitable for different occasions.

Leads to 3+2 Make-up and Skincare; New Zealand Certificate in Beauty Therapy (Level 4)

Cookery (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



22 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn to prepare and cook delicious meals through a variety of methods from steaming, to poaching, frying and roasting in our full scale commercial kitchens.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Cookery (Level 3); 3+2 Cookery

Hairdressing (Level 2)1



Term 1 - 3



3 credits (Level 1) 19 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays / Fridays (to be confirmed)

Learn how to perform a shampoo, treatment and scalp massage while gaining knowledge of work place requirements and personal presentation. Create different hairstyles using heated tools and increase your knowledge of different hair products.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Hairdressing (Salon Support) (Level 3)

Term 1 - 3



24 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn how to prepare hot and cold beverages, elements of contamination hazards, service delivery, table service and menu types.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Food and Beverage (Level 3); 3+2 Food and Beverage

Sport & Exercise (Level 2) (Pending approval)



Term 1 - 3



17 credits (Level 2) 5 credits (Level 3)



Thursdays

Learn how the body works, through understanding basic anatomy concepts and applying these principles to real life movements. Utilise gym equipment and stretching techniques to practice your skills.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Sport Recreation and Exercise (Level 3); 3+2 Sport and Fitness

Agriculture (Level 2)

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Term 1 - 3



21 credits (Level 2)



Fridays

Agriculture is a major industry in the Taranaki region and the course content includes elements of sheep and beef farming, biodiversity as well as dairy farming. Elements of farm safety and general good farm practices complete this course.

Leads to Agriculture (Level 3)

Animal Care (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



16 credits (Level 2)



Fridays

Learn skills in animal handling (with an emphasis on large animals inlcuding horses and cattle), safe practices and gain an introduction to general animal care. Pathways exist in New Zealand Certificate in Animal Care (Companion Animals) Level 3 and New Zealand Certificate in Animal Technology (Vet Nursing Assistant).

Leads to Veterinary Nursing & Animal Care - UCOL Level 3 and Level 6 courses

Agriculture (Level 3)



Term 1 - 3



20 credits (Level 3)



Fridays

You will demonstrate knowledge of cattle anatomy and physiology, handle and move livestock, learn to install and maintain fencing and manage risks around the rural workplace.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Agriculture Farming Systems (Level 3); New Zealand Certificate in Primary Industries Operational Skills (Level 3)

Conservation Skills (Supporting native plant environments) (Level 2) (Pending approval)



Term 1 - 3



21 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Are you keen on conservation and New Zealand's natural environment? This course will focus on NZ forest habitats and cover a range of topics including conservation skills, tree management, sustainable forests and native plant environments. Chainsaws, bush skills, plant identification and health and safety will be covered including a focus on native trees and wildlife. Pathways from this course lead to Pest Operations, Forestry and other sustainable courses found in our Agriculture and Horticulture programmes.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Forestry Harvesting Operations (Level 3)







Choose this pathway if you enjoy:

- raising and working with animals
- planting, growing and harvesting trees, plants and crops
- driving tractors, motorbikes, boats and heavy machinery
- physical work, and working with your hands

- science and research.

Introduction to Education and Care (Level 3) (Pending approval)



Term 1 - 3



18 credits (Level 2)



Thursdays

Do you have a passion for education and supporting others in their learning? This course will start you on the journey to teaching, care and supporting others to learn. The units will include educational theory and practice and there will be many opportunities to engage with student support services, educational centres and public health support.

The course aims to build a basic knowledge and passion for teaching and learning and will enable pathways to Level 3 (to be developed) and onto further study with Educare or into teaching degrees.

Uniformed Services and Policing (Level 3) (Pending approval)



Term 1 - 3



19 credits (Level 3)



Fridays

This course is designed to help you learn about all aspects of uniformed services careers including Defence, Fire, Hato Hone St John, Search and Rescue, Coast Guard and the New Zealand Police force.

You will gain a deeper understanding of the options within these careers and what skills and leadership qualities are needed to be successful. The end result will be that you will have the confidence and skills to apply for a career in your selected service.

For Year 13 students who have completed NCEA Level 2.

As part of the 3+2 programme you will spend three days a week at school, and two days a week at WITT Te Pūkenga working toward a Level 3 qualification. You will do this for Terms 1-3, and then in Term 4 you are solely at school to help focus on school exams.

Benefits:

- Gain a FREE and RELEVANT Level 3 tertiary qualification while still at school
- Learn a new subject that may not be available at school
- Study towards NCEA Level 3

- Build on previous achievement and experience at NCEA Level 2
- Gain hands-on experience in a particular career pathway
- Still be enrolled at school easing the transition into the tertiary study environment

New Zealand Certificate in Sport, Recreation and Exercise (Multi-Sector) (Level 3)



Term 1 - 3



46 credits (Level 3)



Mondays and Tuesdays

Gain the knowledge and skills needed to operate under direct supervision in support roles within and/or across the sport, recreation and exercise industries. Graduates will be able to operate within a framework of health and wellness in relation to individuals, groups and community needs.

New Zealand Certificate in Food and Beverage Service (Level 3)



Term 1 - 3



60 credits (Level 3)



Mondays and Tuesdays

Learn essential front-of-house skills from the art of coffee making to bar and restaurant service. By working in a real restaurant and café students gain practical knowledge preparing them for industry or further studies. 



Degree Scholarships

WITT Te Pükenga offers degree level scholarships to eligible Taranaki school leaver applicants. The scholarships cover a year of tuition fees (up to \$7,500). If you are entitled to the Government Fees-Free year, this scholarship will cover your second year of study which means two years of your study at WITT will be fees-free.
