

Vocational Pathways

Vocational Pathways provide a simple way to understand how your studies align to industry. They enable you to see how your learning is relevant for a wide range of jobs and study options in six broad sectors of industry.

The Vocational Pathways are the product of a partnership between government agencies, the industry training sector, secondary and tertiary representatives, industry, and employer representatives.

Vocational Pathways provide tools so you can develop a career map and plan what you may need to study to meet your goals and move into further study and the workforce.





For Year 11 students, but Year 12 and 13 students are also welcome. STAR courses are short taster style classes that help you to explore career options and make informed decisions about your future schooling, work or study. Courses take place over one to nine weeks and are only a few days in total.

Bakery

The STAR Bakery course will give you an overview and introduction to baking goods in a commercial environment. You will be equipped with health and safety skills and will learn what you need to do to pursue a career in chef training/baking.

Beauty Therapy¹

The course is designed to give you an introduction to beauty treatments such as mini facials, nail file and paint, hand massage and eyebrow grooming. You will also learn personal presentation while gaining elementary skills.

Cookery

Our STAR Introduction to Cookery Programme is designed for students who are interested in hospitality and cookery as a career path. This programme gives an insight into what is needed to become a chef, and will give you a feel for working in a commercial kitchen.

Hair, Beauty and Makeup¹

The course is designed to give students an introduction into how to perform a manicure, learn basic make-up application techniques and style long hair using heated tools. You will also learn personal presentation while gaining elementary skills.

Hairdressing¹

This course is designed to give you an introduction to the hairdressing industry. You will learn personal presentation and gain elementary skills.

Hospitality - Barista*

This course is designed to give you an introduction to the hospitality industry by providing the opportunity to learn how to use commercial espresso coffee equipment and prepare espresso beverages. You will also learn how to prepare and present espresso beverages for service.

*Available in South Taranaki or for specific groups by arrangement.

Hospitality - Front of House*

This course covers a basic understanding of hospitality terminology, equipment, personal presentation, preparation and clearing of areas for table service in a commercial establishment.

*Also available in South Taranaki by arrangement.

Make-Up1

This course is designed to give you an introduction to the make-up industry, learning basic make-up application as well as exploring your creative side; applying bold on-trend techniques.

Sport & Fitness

Start learning skills for a career in sport and fitness. Gain knowledge about exercise equipment and the professional gym environment.

CONSTRUCTION & INFRASTRUCTURE

Students must wear safety boots in all workshop classes

Carpentry

Gain an introduction into the carpentry and construction industry. The course allows you to undertake a small building, construction, and allied trades (BCAT) project to become familiar with hardware and fastenings.

Painting and Decorating

This course has been designed to give you an introduction to the painting and decorating industry. It will allow you to undertake a painting and decorating project to familiarise you with basic tools and equipment used within the industry.

Plumbing

Get an introduction to plumbing, gasfitting and drainlaying. There will be a number of practical activities to demonstrate the nature of the work and act as a taster for the Trades Academy and full-time courses.

MANYFACTYRING & TECHNOLOGY

Students must wear safety boots in all workshop classes

Automotive

Work on real engines and cars and gain insight into a career as an automotive professional. Over the weeks, you'll dismantle, inspect and re-assemble an engine in our fully-equipped workshop.

Electrical

The skills demonstrated in this course apply to most electrical and electronic trades. You will perform soldering procedures and will gain knowledge of electrical safety and safe working practices in an electrical workplace.

Mechanical Engineering

Work in our fully equipped mechanical engineering workshop to assemble mechanical components, test and store assemblies in a practical environment.

Engineering Core Skills

Work in our fully equipped mechanical engineering workshop, develop core fabrication and mechanical skills in a practical environment, you will undertake a fabrication project showing you an insight to the pre-trade programmes.













CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

Drawing

Use drawing methods and skills for recording information using wet and dry media.

PRIMARY INDUSTRIES

Agriculture

This course will introduce you to a commercial farming environment. You will learn about animal behaviour, control and feed management.

Conservation

This course will introduce you to the forestry industry. You will learn about forest harvesting operations and quality and value factors in logs.

SKILLS FOR LIVING

Skills for Living

This course is designed to assist students with special learning disabilities to develop personal skills that will assist them to function productively within a tertiary environment in the future and to transition smoothly from secondary school.

For secondary school students studying towards NCEA Level 1 or 2. You should have a genuine interest in a particular vocational pathway.

In the Taranaki Trades Academy you come to WITT at least one day a week over several terms and gain NCEA credits. The learning takes place in a practical and hands-on environment using industry standard equipment and technology relevant to your chosen career path. Develop the foundation skills needed to progress to further study opportunities or move directly into employment.

You will learn skills including; graphics, design, media and portfolio generation. Further study available in creative technology or digital technology at WITT.

Build a Bach (Level 2) (New Plymouth and Hāwera)



Term 1 - 4



56 credits (approx.) (mainly Level 2)



3 days per week

Gain experience in building, construction, carpentry, roofing, how to read and interpret plans, health and safety, plus hand and power tool use and maintenance. You will spend three days at WITT and work on building projects and a small dwelling. There is also an opportunity to participate in work experience.

Build a Bridge (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



21 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

You will work with the Talent Pipeline companies and NPDC to create a foot bridge for the community.

Electrical (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



23 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn to use electrical test instruments and the elements and processes of electrical circuits. You will perform manual soldering and de-soldering and gain knowledge of electrical diagrams.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Electrical Pre-Trade (Level 3)

Joinery (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



22 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Gain knowledge of portable power tools, carpentry hand tools, timber machining equipment, timber, mechanical and non-mechanical construction equipment.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Construction Trade Skills (Carpentry) (Level 3)

Plumbing (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



19 credits (approx.) (Level 2) 3 credits (approx.) (Level 1)



Thursdays

Learn introductory skills in residential plumbing and trades services. This course leads to the New Zealand Certificate in Plumbing, Gasfitting and Drainlaying (Level 3) or onto work places and a Level 4 apprenticeship.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Plumbing, Gas fitting and Drainlaying (Level 3)

20 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn about workshop practices, hazardous materials and knowledge of tools and equipment, lamps, wheel balancing, general engineering, automotive components and petrol fuel systems. You will also disassemble and reassemble an engine under supervision.

Engineering Trades (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



18 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn about engineering equipment, components and how to perform basic machining, fabrication and welding techniques in our fully equipped workshops.

Engineering Trades (Level 3) - Build a Trailer



Term 1 - 3



12 credits (approx.) (Level 3) 18 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Mondays and Tuesdays

Aimed at students following on from Engineering Level 2. You will build on your capabilities in mechanical engineering to earn Level 2 and 3 credits while building a trailer. The programme includes low carbon steel welding, thermal cutting and automotive wiring.

14 credits (approx.) (Level 2) 4 credits (approx.) (Level 3)



Thursdays or Fridays

Learn to perform cosmetic services and facial treatments while recognising different facial skin types. Unpack current fashion trends related to beauty therapy and apply make-up techniques suitable for different occasions.

Cookery (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



22 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn to prepare and cook delicious meals through a variety of methods from steaming, to poaching, frying and roasting in our full scale commercial kitchens.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Cookery (Level 3); 3+2 Cookery





Hairdressing (Level 2)1



Term 1 - 3



3 credits (approx.) (Level 1) 19 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays / Fridays (to be confirmed)

Learn how to perform a shampoo, treatment and scalp massage while gaining knowledge of work place requirements and personal presentation. Create different hairstyles using heated tools and increase your knowledge of different hair products.

Restaurant Service (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



24 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Learn how to prepare hot and cold beverages, elements of contamination hazards, service delivery, table service and menu types.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Food and Beverage (Level 3); 3+2 Food and Beverage

Sport & Exercise (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



17 credits (approx.) (Level 2) 5 credits (approx.) (Level 3)



Thursdays

Learn how the body works, through understanding basic anatomy concepts and applying these principles to real life movements. Utilise gym equipment and stretching techniques to practice your skills.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Sport Recreation and Exercise (Level 3); 3+2 Sport and Fitness

Agriculture (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



21 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Fridays

Agriculture is a major industry in the Taranaki region and the course content includes elements of sheep and beef farming, biodiversity as well as dairy farming. Elements of farm safety and general good farm practices complete this course.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Agriculture (Farming Systems) (Level 3)

Conservation Skills (Supporting native plant environments) (Level 2)



Term 1 - 3



21 credits (approx.) (Level 2)



Thursdays

Are you keen on conservation and New Zealand's natural environment? This course will focus on NZ forest habitats and cover a range of topics including conservation skills, tree management, sustainable forests and native plant environments. Chainsaws, bush skills, plant identification and health and safety will be covered including a focus on native trees and wildlife. Pathways from this course lead to Pest Operations, Forestry and other sustainable courses found in our Agriculture and Horticulture programmes.

Leads to New Zealand Certificate in Pest Operations (Rural) (Level 3)





Choose this pathway if you enjoy:

- · raising and working with animals
- planting, growing and harvesting trees, plants and crops
- driving tractors, motorbikes, boats and heavy machinery
- physical work, and working with your hands
- working with tools, machinery and equipment
- science and research.

Jobs in primary industries:

- · caring for and rearing animals
- · fruit and vegetable production
- dairy farming
- seed technologist, landscaper
- horse trainer, veterinarian
- looking after or measuring trees
- machines and equipment operator or servicer, heavy vehicle driver
- processing food or seafood,
- supply chain logistics.



For Year 13 students who have completed NCEA Level 2.

As part of the 3+2 programme you will spend three days a week at school, and two days a week at WITT working toward a Level 3 qualification. You will do this for Terms 1-3, and then in Term 4 you are solely at school to help focus on school exams.

Benefits:

- Gain a FREE and RELEVANT Level 3 tertiary qualification while still at school
- Learn a new subject that may not be available at school
- Gain hands-on experience in a particular career pathway
- Study towards NCEA Level 3
- Still be enrolled at school easing the transition into the tertiary study environment
- Build on previous achievement and experience at NCEA Level 2

Perform a full manicure and pedicure including masks and hand massage. Apply skincare services while learning different skin types, conditions and functions of the skin. Apply make-up for different occasions, assist with sales and promotional activities and gain confidence preparing them for employment in the beauty sector or chosen career pathway.
